
Holy Week and Easter Worship

- March 22 Spirit of Joy in God's Presence



Ask the Pastor about...



Some of our members have questions about some of our worship practices or items in the church. If you have any questions, please forward them to Pastor Lisinski to explain in our newsletter. In the last issue he described the Paschal Candle.

At my ordination – at St. Peter Roman Catholic Church in London, Ontario, on June 20, AD 1986 - Bishop William Huras, Advent's first pastor, laid his hands on the head of each one of our church's twelve new pastors and, for the first time in the history of our synod, included a rite of anointing our hands, with the admonition: "Accept this anointing with the oil of gladness. Recall the ministry of service to which you are enjoined under the sign of the cross." Since then the practice of anointing has become a standard rubric of ordinations. as well as an increasingly familiar practice in local parish ministry, including our own congregation.

In the early church, the sick were anointed with oil, in conjunction with prayers for healing, confession and forgiveness (James 5:13-16). Most commonly olive oil was used, as a sign of reconciliation with God rooted in the story of a dove returning to Noah's Ark with an olive branch in its beak after the

flood waters had receded. Anointing has long been central to the Christian sacrament of Holy Baptism, which culminates with laying on of hands and prayer for the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit (the subject of our Lent sermon series on the first four Sundays in March). The sign of the cross is traced – either with oil or water – on the baptized person's forehead as a ritual expression of the presence and power of



God's Spirit, binding the newly born child of God together with Jesus Christ.

'Christ" is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word "Messiah", which means "Anointed One". And although the traditional title of Messiah became associated with the royal line of King David, to whom God gave the promise of an eternal kingdom, perhaps Israel's first Messiah was actually Joshua (the focus for our weekly Bible Studies during Lent). Though not formally anointed by a priest, Joshua was divinely appointed by God to lead the chosen people into the Promised Land after the death of Moses. It is surely no accident that the name Jesus – given to Mary and Joseph by the angel of the Lord announcing his conception (Matthew 1:21; Luke 1:31) – is the Greek translation of the name Joshua, which means "God saves". Thus Jesus Christ is the One anointed by God to save the children of God from everything that distorts our humanity and all that destroys the communal life of justice, peace and freedom for which God created and pre-destined us.

God accomplishes all of this in baptism, as Rev. Dr. Martin Luther explains in his *Small Catechism*: "It brings about forgiveness of sins, redeems from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe it, as the words and promise of God declare" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, p. 1165).

Whether it be the oppression of the weak by the strong, as in the story of Exodus; the suffering of the sick and outcast restored to fullness of life in the ministry of Jesus, or humanity's bondage to sin overcome by Jesus' death on the cross, God's salvation means victory over everything that makes those created in the divine image of God less than fully human. This is the promise and power signified in baptism, and the meaning of all other symbolic rites of anointing practiced among God's faithful people since ancient times.

Whether with oil or water, anointing is a sign of humanity's reconciliation with God. And as the people of God in Christ, baptized and anointed with the same Holy Spirit, the divine calling to which we are enjoined under the sign of the cross is to serve the world – as dearly beloved teacher of worship and liturgy in our synod, Pastor Paul Bosch, expresses it "Messiah the world" – in the human hope of eternal peace within the holy communion of God's new creation, established in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, the world's Messiah, Saviour and Lord.

Annual Meeting Highlights

On February 15, thirty-four voting members attended Advent's annual meeting.

Reports

Fred Roth reviewed the Treasurer's report and noted that our cash flow stabilized during 2014 and thanked everyone for their efforts. Fred thanked Jai Sahadeo for his help in preparing the financial statements and Brenda Kroeker for her work in keeping in touch with our users and ensuring their payments are on time. The Peace Pole cost of \$8,475 has been completely covered through donations and everyone was thanked for their contributions. We still have short and long term debt related to the parking lot with \$85,000 still owing. Members are encouraged to help eliminate this debt as soon as we can.

Pastor Lisinski reported that the Peanut Peace Project evolved from the 50th anniversary emphasis during 2014. He is looking for volunteers to assist him in working on the project. Pastor Lisinski also mentioned that it is difficult to get Advent's profile raised in the community. Only one community person responded to the appeal for support for the Peace Pole. He has made overtures for joint ventures with the local Anglican congregation but so far nothing has been organized. He has contacted the local schools to get students involved but so far has had no response. In closing, he referred to his return to the congregation where he grew up and is now the pastor and feels blessed to serve Advent.

Judy Baribeau, as Chair, mentioned the neglect in the garden area and that two options are available: We can designate more of the property for the community garden plots or we can remove much of the shrubbery and return to grass. Members were reminded they agreed to look after the garden area when it was installed, but have not taken care of it.

Brit Missirlian described the We Care Box project that the GWA is supporting for CLWR. More information is available separately in the newsletter.

Elections

Brit Missirlian led
the election
process. Mona
Marcobelli has
completed two
terms on
Council and
is not eligible
for re-election. Brenda

Kroeker was nominated to fill a position. Judy Baribeau, Bob Schickedanz and Erika Schurr were eligible for a second term and agreed to let their names stand. There were no further nominations, and these four people were elected by acclamation for three-year terms. Council is able to appoint additional persons to serve the two remaining positions until the next annual meeting. Council will meet on March 9 to appoint/elect officers and chairpersons. Gabi Schickedanz was re-elected as the Congregation's representative on the Mutual Ministry Committee, and Sonita Dillon-Rhodius was re-elected to the Endowment Fund Committee. At last year's Toronto Conference annual meeting, Pastor Lisinski was elected as a clergy delegate from the Conference to the ELCIC National Convention this year so we did not need to elect a lay delegate.

Budget

Fred Roth reviewed the budget proposed for 2015 and highlighted that we need to cover \$89,530 from remaining envelopes



to balance the budget. We approved \$162,140 as our 2015 budget.

Other

We are reminded that we should consider contributing to the Endowment Fund so that the interest received from the investment can be used for ministry projects. Members can designate Advent's Endowment Fund in their wills or in the event of a death, designate the Endowment Fund for memorial donations, rather than just the congregation. Other donations throughout the year are also welcome.

Annual Reports and financial statements are available at church for anyone who has not received them. Judy Baribeau thanked everyone for attending the meeting and the meeting was adjourned.
